



A Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study is an environmental and engineering process developed by the Florida Department of Transportation to determine social, economic, natural, and physical environmental effects associated with a proposed transportation improvement project. The process follows procedures set forth in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969 and federal and state laws and regulations. For this study, Okaloosa County is applying this protocol even though this action is not under the jurisdiction of the Florida Department of Transportation.

The study process requires the combined efforts of professional engineers, planners, and scientists who collect and analyze project related information to develop the best solution to balance community, environmental, and transportation needs. An important component of the process is community engagement and agency coordination.

- To support mobility and safety
- Establish a utility corridor for potential utility relocations in the event U.S 98 becomes widened to six-lanes

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The purposes of the proposed West 98 Collector Road Project are to provide an alternative route option for military access and local traffic to support mobility and safety, establish a utility corridor for potential utility relocations in the event U.S 98 becomes widened to six-lanes and evaluate a connection to a potential west gate project on Hurlburt Field.

U.S. 98 is a Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) route in the panhandle of Florida from Pensacola to Panama City. The section of U.S. 98 between the Santa Rosa County line and Hurlburt Field currently experiences heavy traffic congestion





Project Need

U.S. 98 is forced to function like a collector road because there is no parallel facility to collect the local streets. Thus, there is a need for a new collector road parallel to U.S. 98 to serve an alternate route option for local traffic and military access in the unincorporated Florosa Community.

This PD&E Study will evaluate:

3.25-mile Roadway

From Solar Street to Green Drive

2-mile Utility Corridor

Between Green Drive and the Santa Rosa County Line

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Arterial roads, like U.S. 98, often have a supporting network of collector and local roads to help distribute the traffic. Some trips can be taken on local or collector roads and improve safety by reducing potential conflict points with turning traffic and providing an alternative route during incidents or unplanned events.

Therefore, U.S. 98 is forced to function like a collector road because there is no parallel facility to collect the local streets. Thus, there is a need for a new collector road parallel to U.S. 98 to serve an alternate route option for local traffic and military access in the unincorporated Florosa Community. Therefore, this PD&E will only evaluate an approximately 3.25-mile roadway from Solar Street to Green Drive and an approximately 2-mile utility corridor between Green Drive and the Santa Rosa County Line.





Safety & Traffic

U.S. 98 is the only east-west route in the area impacting the entire community. This work to expand the Eglin range easement and relocate the utility corridor should reap huge dividends for the military and our surrounding communities.

Better emergency response with more access options

Creation of new route options during times of congestion and traffic incidents

Further network support when U.S. 98 is widened in the future

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U.S. 98 is the only east-west route in the area impacting the entire community including the 4,100 Hurlburt Field personnel who live west of Hurlburt as well as the thousands of personnel who must travel past Hurlburt Field to Eglin AFB and beyond. This work to expand the Eglin range easement and relocate the utility corridor should reap huge dividends for the military and our surrounding communities.

The intent is to improve traffic on U.S. 98 by relocating the direct access to Florosa Elementary from U.S. 98. In the future, it will also provide a new access to Hurlburt Field by connecting to the planned new Hurlburt Field West Gate. Other benefits include better emergency response with more access options, creation of new route options during times of congestion and traffic incidents, and further network support when U.S. 98 is widened to six-lanes in the future as a separate action.





Societal and Economic Considerations

Currently, residents in the unincorporated Florosa community do not have access to an alternate east-west collector road and must use U.S. 98 for most local trips, including **travel to schools**, **retail shops**, and **places of employment**.

There is a need for a collector road to provide residents making local trips with an alternative to using the heavily congested U.S. 98 corridor.



Previous Considerations

The following alternatives to the West 98 Collector Road Project were previously considered:

- Adjusting the school speed limit
- Adjusting school times and parent drop-offs
- Installing multi-use paths
- Adding traffic signals
- Extending the Cody Interchange on-ramp to Solar Street

These improvements could help, but no combination or inclusion of all, are able to achieve significant safety and travel speed improvements needed for U.S. 98.


The West 98 Collector Road PD&E Study consists of evaluating location and design concepts for an approximate 3.25-mile collector road and an approximately 2-mile utility corridor from just east of Solar Street to the Santa Rosa County line located on property owned by Eglin Air Force Base.

The West 98 Collector Road Project is entirely on Air Force property and the neighborhood connectors will be on Okaloosa County owned land. Acquisition of privately owned property is <u>not</u> anticipated.

The study will also evaluate stormwater requirements in order to minimize flooding between existing U.S. 98 and the proposed West 98 Collector Road.



The limits of the West 98 Collector Road are from U.S. 98 east of Solar Street to Green Drive and will include a connection back to U.S. 98 via one of the local roads near the western limits. Access points from the local roads to the Collector Road and U.S. 98 will be evaluated during the PD&E Study.



The roadway typical section has not yet been determined but is anticipated to be a two-lane facility with a multi-use pathway on Eglin Air Force Base property. Two Alternatives are currently being evaluated.

Alternative 1 consists of two twelve-foot lanes with curb and gutter on the outside. A twelve-foot shared used path is provided along the south side of the roadway. Roadway stormwater will be collected in a closed drainage system via the curb and gutter. This alternative is known as an Urban Typical Section.

To minimize overall drainage impacts, offsite ditches will be utilized on both the north and south sides of the roadway to collect offsite stormwater flowing to the roadway.




Alternative 2 consists of two twelve-foot lanes with ten-foot shoulders, five-feet of which are paved. A twelve-foot shared used path is provided along the south side of the roadway. Roadway stormwater will be collected in an open drainage system via roadside ditches. This alternative is known as a Rural Typical Section.


To minimize overall drainage impacts, offsite ditches will be utilized on both the north and south sides of the roadway to collect offsite stormwater flowing to the roadway.



The limits of the West 98 Collector Utility Corridor are from Green Drive to the Santa Rosa County Line.



Additionally, Hurlburt Field has asked Okaloosa County to evaluate a connection for a potential west gate and a new roadway that would provide enhanced connectivity to the area that would connect to the proposed West 98 Collector to Hurlburt Field.



In the overall transportation development process, we are in the Project Development and Environment, or PD&E Study phase.

Future project phases are Design, Right-of-Way, and Construction, and are not yet funded for implementation. This Public Information Meeting is an important part of the PD&E Study phase where we seek input before identifying the Preferred Alternative.

After considering public input, the engineering and environmental evaluation is completed, followed by a public hearing before a decision is made.


All written comments received by August 14, 2025, will become part of the public meeting record.
