

# **Signal Success**



Traffic Operations crews recently installed a new loop detection wire at the traffic signal in front of Florosa Elementary in preparation for the new school year. Loop detection systems in traffic signals use inductive loops embedded in the road to detect vehicles. These loops are essentially wires embedded in the pavement that create a magnetic field. When a vehicle passes over the loop, it changes the magnetic field, which is then detected by the system, triggering a signal change.

### Fall lawn care questions

### How can I prevent winter annual lawn weeds?

If your lawn has a history of winter annual weeds such as henbit, wild geranium, annual bluegrass, chickweed and lawn burweed, you can apply a preemergence herbicide to prevent these weeds from emerging. Apply it during October when nighttime temperatures drop to 55° to 60°F for several consecutive nights. This will be just before the winter annual weeds emerge.

**Should I fertilize my lawn in the fall?** The last application should be no later than the end of September. Choose a lawn fertilizer with low nitrogen or controlled-release nitrogen and with sufficient potassium. The fertilizer should have little to no phosphorus unless a soil test indicates a need for it. Avoid "weed and feed" products.

### Should I overseed my lawn with annual ryegrass?

Overseeding a lawn with ryegrass to create a green lawn during winter is mostly done for cosmetic reasons. Personally, I don't overseed because I'm ready to take a break from routine lawn care. I take a break, my mower takes a break, and my lawn takes a break. The optimal time to broadcast the ryegrass seed is mid-October through mid-November if you wish to have a winter lawn.

### Should I let fall tree leaves stay on the lawn?

You should not allow a thick layer of leaves to accumulate and remain on the lawn for long periods. A layer of leaves left on the lawn through winter can reduce oxygen and sunlight availability to the lawn. This may result in a weak, thin lawn in spring. Also, a layer of leaves may hold too much water and cause rot problems for your lawn. A few leaves (scattering of leaves) should not be a problem, though.

# CONTAMINATION CAUSES PROBLEMS





# Did you know?

Recycling contamination happens when trash ruins otherwise good recyclables. For example, food waste and liquids saturate paper and cardboard. Once contaminated, these materials can no longer be recycled. They become trash that will be separated out and sent to the landfill.

On a recent visit to our local Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) we learned that the greatest contamination threat in Okaloosa County actually comes from plastic bags! You should not bag your recycling. Recyclables stuck inside plastic bags never make it through the recycling process.
